### Colombian bishops applaud historic peace accord

The Episcopal Conference of Colombia applauded the recent signing of a peace agreement between the Colombian government and the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC) after four years of negotiations. This agreement, which will be put to a plebiscite on October 2, would end more than five decades of violent conflict. The Catholic Church in Colombia has played an important role in supporting the peace process and will play an equally important role in contributing to the implementation of the accord. ### Reflections on the Church's role in the peace process

Msgr. Héctor Fabio Henao, director of the National Social Pastoral Secretariat and Caritas Colombia, reflected on the Church's role in the peace process for a Catholic Peacebuilding Network Convening on Strengthening Catholic Engagement in Peace Processes, August 3-5, at The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. ### **Colombia week of peace and reconciliation**

In recognition of Peace Week (September 4-11), Msgr. Héctor Fabio Henao released [this video](#), inviting the Catholic Church of Colombia to embrace the week as an opportunity "to unite around prayer and action for peace." In his video message, Msgr. Henao emphasizes the need "to commit ourselves in the image of Jesus and the good Samaritan," to go forth in the spirit of forgiveness and heal wounds, as well as to overcome hatred and division.

### **Notre Dame's Kroc Institute to monitor implementation of the Colombian peace accord**

The Colombia peace accord gives the University of Notre Dame's Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies primary responsibility for technical verification and monitoring of implementation of the accord through the Peace Accords Matrix(PAM) Barometer Initiative. This is the first time a university-based research center has played such a direct role in supporting the implementation of a peace agreement. While the agreement is incredibly complex and the question of whether implementation will go as expected remains unanswered, John Paul Lederach, Professor of International Peacebuilding at the Kroc Institute and Senior Fellow with Humanity United, believes PAM's barometer approach will facilitate continual improvement of implementation capacities. ### **South Sudan: South Sudan Council of Churches sends Message to UN Security Council**

On September 3, the South Sudan Council of Churches (SSCC) sent a message to the United Nations Security Council Delegation to South Sudan advocating "for a collectively focused strategy with the involvement of all peace partners ranging from [the] National, Regional and International scene." The SCC calls upon the UN Security Council to support the presidency of South Sudan in non-violent dialogue, redouble its efforts to engage all stakeholders, help create a platform for economic stability, and to reiterate and sustain the call for peace, reconciliation, recovery, and rehabilitation. ### **CPN Convening on Strengthening Catholic Engagement in Peace Processes**

From August 3-5, the Catholic Peacebuilding Network sponsored a Convening on Strengthening Catholic Engagement in Peace Processes. Held at The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC., this convening was co-sponsored by the Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies, University of Notre Dame; Caritas Internationalis; Catholic Relief Services; the Office of International Justice and Peace, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops; the Berkley Center for

Religion, Peace, and World Affairs, Georgetown University; and the Institute for Policy Research and Catholic Studies, The Catholic University of America. Some 30 peacebuilders from 10 countries attended. The meeting will contribute to the development of resources to assist Catholic institutions in strategic planning for engagement in peace processes, transitional justice and reconciliation, and efforts to address conflicts associated with extractives.

### **Bishops and Scholars from Europe and the USA Renew Efforts on Nuclear Disarmament**

On May 24-25, 40 bishops, Catholic scholars, and policy specialists from 9 countries gathered in London to strengthen Catholic efforts to highlight the theological and moral dimensions of creating the conditions for a world without nuclear weapons.
