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## **Materials from the Conference on the Future of Catholic Peacebuilding Now Available**

Some 300 people from 28 countries participated in the Fifth International Conference of the Catholic Peacebuilding Network. The Conference on the Future of Catholic Peacebuilding was held at the University of Notre Dame, April 13-16. In addition to the Catholic Peacebuilding Network, 18 Catholic universities and Church organizations co-sponsored this conference. 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## **Archbishop of Yangon Pleads for Aid for Myanmar**

Archbishop Charles Bo, President of the Myanmar Episcopal Conference, issued the following statement on May 25: The local response in Myanmar has been hugely important in these initial few weeks; however, resources and capacity have been stretched. Therefore, the news that the government will allow all aid workers into the country is welcomed. Amidst the stories of despair is also hope. The people of Myanmar have joined together in their solidarity for those affected by the cyclone. The emergency relief phase is not over as basic needs of hundreds and thousands of people still need to be met. Children are particularly vulnerable at this time. The church remains committed to continue support and hope and to reach further into the country with relief and to support communities to rebuild lives and livelihoods for the future of Myanmar.
