Social Science Research Council Working Paper: *Religion, Reconciliation and Transitional Justice: The State of the Field.*

In the wave of transitional justice activity over the past generation, religion has played a dramatic, influential, and at times surprising role.

So says Daniel Philpott, in a religion and reconciliation working paper from the Social Science Research Council (SSRC). Religion's role, he suggests, has arguably established an alternative approach to transitional justice, one that differs substantially from the reigning liberal "peacebuilding consensus." Catholic Relief Services and Kroc Institute Team Up in the Philippines on Peacebuilding

For the seventh year in a row, peacebuilders from around the world gathered for the Catholic Relief Services-Kroc Institute Peacebuilding Institute. Held in Mindanao, the Philippines, between Oct. 21-26, 2007, 31 specialists from 16 countries explored the challenges and opportunities faced by the Catholic community working to build peace in conflict areas from Southeast Asia and Colombia to Sudan, Burundi, and northern Uganda. The institute's host, CRS's peacebuilding program in Mindanao, is known for its innovative programs to promote inter-religious peacebuilding. Since 2000, CRS and the Kroc Institute have partnered to bring together peacebuilders and practitioners for a week of intensive training in religious peacebuilding, conflict transformation, community-based peacebuilding, and related areas. More than 300 peacebuilders – from presidents of bishops' conferences to a wide range of CRS specialists – have participated in these institutes.
