### Colloquium on Revitalizing Catholic Engagement on Nuclear Disarmament

Bishops, policy specialists, scholars and students gathered April 25-26 at Stanford University for the Colloquium on Revitalizing [U.S.] Catholic Engagement on Nuclear Disarmament to discuss the ethics of nuclear weapons and ways to achieve nuclear disarmament. "Nuclear weapons present an existential threat to mankind," said former U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz, one of the hosts of the event. He said he welcomed "the important moral and religious voice that the Catholic community in the United States contributes to this effort." The event was hosted by

Stanford's Hoover Institution and Freeman Spogli Institute with support of the Nuclear Threat Initiative. It was sponsored by the U.S. bishops' international committee, Notre Dame's Office of the President and Kroc Institute, Georgetown's Berkley Center, and Boston College. ### **Nigeria: Letters on Dialogue and Peace**

"When the girls are back home, and the Boko Haram are disarmed, (I say 'when' not 'if') there will still be the tedious task of dialogue, reconciliation, mutual forgiveness and peace, for which the force of religion will be most needed. This will demand that religious communities join hands and call on the One God who takes care of us all," wrote John Cardinal Onaiyekan, Archbishop of Abuja, Nigeria. Over the course of May, Cardinal Onaiyekan wrote three letters from Rome with his reflections and suggestions to address the kidnapping of the girls and the conflict with Boko Haram. ### **Burundi: New Diocesan Synods**

Monsignor Gervais Banshimiyubusa, Bishop of Ngozi and President of the Episcopal Conference of Burundi, told the Fides News Agency during his *ad limina* visit to Rome about new Diocesan Synods which will be organized throughout the country. "Through the Synods we want to ensure that every believer from Burundi deepens his/her Christian vocation and for every single community to think about its own way of coming together to contribute to peace and national reconciliation," he said. ### **Democratic Republic of Congo: Religious Leaders for Electoral Integrity**

Religious leaders in the Democratic Republic of Congo created the Integrity Commission and Electoral Mediation (CIME) after a participating in a workshop organized by the Independent National Electoral Commission (CENI). ### **Reconciliation Process in South Sudan**

On April 5, 2014, the National Platform for Peace and Reconciliation was issued by three nationally-mandated institutions: the Committee for National Healing, Peace and Reconciliation (CNHPR); the South Sudan Peace and Reconciliation Commission; and the Specialised Parliamentary Committee for Peace and Reconciliation. The principals of the three entities acknowledge that they "rely heavily on the moral authority, infrastructure and outreach of the church and its leaders for access and support to all our communities. Our most critical partner is the churches and religious community." Read statement. ### **Sri Lanka: Reconciliation Needed for Peace**

A group of bishops from Sri Lanka visited the Vatican in early May for their *ad limina* visit. Pope Francis highlighted the Church's role in bringing together a divided nation, saying, "As the country seeks to come together and heal, the Church is uniquely positioned to provide a living image of unity in the faith." While in the Vatican, the Bishop of Jaffna, Mgr. Thomas Savundranayagam, said their ministry as Bishops and Christians is reconciliation. He criticized the government for not showing appropriate empathy and sorrow for civilian victims. "Solidarity and mutual acceptance are fundamental: we have to live together in this little town, freeing it from division and hatred, growing in harmony. This is the only hope for Sri Lanka. The Church has a prophetic role in this process."

### **Israel: Peace in the Holy Land**

"The path of dialogue, reconciliation and peace must constantly be taken up anew, courageously and tirelessly," Pope Francis said during his trip to the Holy Land. The Pope reminded his audience that Jerusalem means "city of peace," and called for peace in the region. "May efforts and energies be increasingly directed to the pursuit of a just and lasting solution to the conflicts which have caused so much suffering." ### **Panama: Pastoral Congress on Human Mobility**

The first Pastoral Congress on Human Mobility, organized by the Latin American Episcopal Council (CELAM) and other organizations, took place May 12-16 in Panama City. More than 130 people from various countries around Latin American and the Caribbean participated. The closing statement from the Congress describes issues of suffering and violence against migrants and others and outlines their commitments to migrants, itinerant people, the people of the sea and tourism, refugees and displaced persons.
