

# 2023 Catholic Korea Peace Forum Program

(As of October 18, 2023)

### Objectives and Background

- ◆ 2023 Catholic Korea Peace Forum: "DMZ to HIROSHIMA"
   The Role of American, Korean, and Japanese Religion for Peace in Northeast Asia –
- ◆ Date and Venue: October 25 (Wednesday) 29 (Sunday), 2023 Paju, Korea, and Hiroshima, Japan
- ◆ Co-host: Committee for the Reconciliation of the Korean People, Catholic Institute of Northeast Asia Peace
- ◆ Sponsor: Gyeonggi-do, Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism

#### Objectives

- ① To strengthen the solidarity between the U.S., Korea, and Japan's Bishops' Conference to promote peace in Northeast Asia
- ② To seek the role of religion and civil society in de-escalating military tensions on the Korean Peninsula and Northeast Asia where the climate crisis is imminent
- ③ To promote understanding of the Korean Peninsula's denuclearization and the Catholic Church's peacebuilding role in achieving above ① and ②

#### Background

The Korean War, with the 70th anniversary of the armistice in 2023, has not officially ended yet and is one of the main causes of conflict that threatens not only the Korean Peninsula but also Northeast Asia and world peace. The first-ever summit between the U.S. and North Korea in 2018 raised hopes for a peaceful resolution of the Korean Peninsula issue, but the second summit between the U.S. and North Korea broke down in February 2019, and the dialogue between the U.S., South Korea, and North Korea lost momentum. Since the global pandemic of COVID-19 in early 2020, North Korea has been more isolated, and on top of that the imposed economic sanctions due to North Korea's nuclear weapons development and the infectious diseases have seriously threatened the survival of the people in North Korea.



'The No-Deal Hanoi Summit' has worsened not only the relations between the U.S. and North Korea but also inter-Korea relations. North Korea openly expressed its distrust in the South Korean authorities. The inter-Korean exchanges were completely stalled, and military tensions on the Korean Peninsula, where dialogue was suspended, rose again in 2022. Furthermore, with the outbreak of the Russia-Ukraine war, the arms race in Northeast Asia has accelerated. North Korea's ongoing missile tests and the firm stance of the Yoon Administration against North Korea's provocation have been raising fears of armed conflict on the Korean Peninsula.

To explore the role of the church for peace on the Korean Peninsula and Northeast Asia, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Committee on International Justice and Peace (USCCB CIJP) and the Japan Catholic Council for Justice and Peace have actively participated in the international conference of the Catholic Institute of Northeast Asia Peace (CINAP), which has been held every year since 2017. Cardinal Robert Walter McElroy (Bishop of San Diego) and Bishop Matsuura Goro (松浦悟郎, Bishop of Nagoya) participated in the international conference held in December 2017, when the war crisis was heightened, and in the international conference of 2019, chairman of the Japan Catholic Council for Justice and Peace, Bishop Katsuya Taiji(勝谷太治, Bishop of Sapporo) participated.

In October 2022, the international conference was held in Washington, D.C. to strengthen the solidarity of the U.S.-Korea bishops' Conference. The "2022 Catholic Korea Peace Forum" was co-hosted by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Korea's Committee for the Reconciliation of the Korean People (CBCK CRKP), the USCCB CIJP, and the CINAP. Many scholars who studied the peace issues on the Korean Peninsula, as well as government officials, attended the Forum. Participants reaffirmed the necessity and possibility of international cooperation between religious and civil society to resolve the Korean Peninsula issues peacefully through the Forum. During the official visit to the U.S. Department of State and Congress, the U.S. bishops introduced South Korean bishops as 'brother bishops' and exchanged views on the church's position on inter-Korean relations and the creative and humanitarian aid to North Koreans. This was one of the Forum's most important achievements in discussing the ongoing meeting of bishops for peace on the Korean Peninsula.

Global cooperation is desperately needed to overcome the climate crisis, but the current situation in Northeast Asia shows the epitome of a "security dilemma." While the vicious cycle



of the arms race is adding more to military tension and the overall crisis, the CINAP and CBCK CRKP aim to co-host the Catholic Korea Peace Forum in October 2023. We hope for stronger solidarity of the bishops' Conference of the United States, South Korea, and Japan at a time when efforts for peace are more urgent than ever.

## Distinctive features of the 2023 event: "Field Visit & Youth Programs"

- ① A linear field visit from DMZ to Hiroshima after Conference 1 in Korea
- ② The U.S., Korea, Japan's bishops' joint visit to the Joint Security Area (JSA), the symbolic place of the 70th anniversary of the Armistice
  - 3 Programs designed for American, Korean, and Japanese youth

#### **3 Proposed Topics for Discussion**

- 1. Efforts of the U.S., Japan, and Korea's Catholic Church and the Vatican to advance peace on the Korean Peninsula and Northeast Asia, celebrating the 70th anniversary of the Armistice Agreement of the Korean War
- 2. The North Korean nuclear crisis, the dangers of an arms race in Northeast Asia, and the efforts toward anti-nuclear proliferation and peacebuilding.
- **3.** Environmental issues such as the climate crisis (North Korea's food shortage is also linked to this issue.)
- 4. Prospects of young people on peace issues on the Korean Peninsula and Northeast Asia
